

#### From the Treasurer

#### TRAVEL GRANTS

The BSDB awards three types of grants to its members, with preference given to graduate students and postdocs.

BSDB Spring and Autumn meetings
These are the only UK meetings for which
there is BSDB support, and grants cover basic
travel and conference expenses (but not
conference dinners). We are currently able to
fund demand but, if numbers increase,
preference will be given to members who
present posters (but see comment on foreign
meetings).

#### Practical courses

Support of up to £300 is available for these courses and, at the moment, all applicants are funded. If more than about 8 members a year apply, however, a selection procedure will be introduced.

Foreign meetings

This is the category for which there is greatest demand and we cannot fund everyone. Rather than give members grants that are too small to be useful, current policy is as follows:

\* About £350 will be available every month and awards will be made at the end of the month.

\* No more than two people from one Department or one person from a group will be awarded a grant to go to a particular meeting, and preference will be given to members presenting work. If the Treasurer has no obvious grounds for assigning a grant to an excess of applicants from a group, the lab head will be asked to decide who will receive the money.

To apply for a travel grant, members should write to the **Treasurer** giving details of the proposed visit and the breakdown of the amount of money requested. They should enclose with the application a letter of support from their supervisor or laboratory head and, if apppropriate, the abstract of the poster or talk they intend to present.

#### Louie Hamilton Fund

There is a small amount of money available from the Louie Hamilton Fund to provide travel support for handicapped members. Applicants should contact the **Treasurer**.

#### **MEMBERSHIP**

Last year, all members who were not paying the full subscription (£20 for normal and £7.50 for student membership) were contacted and asked to upgrade their standing orders. Members paying less than £10 who did not send in a new standing order were struck off the list, while those paying £10 were to be given one last chance- this is it.

A letter will soon be sent to all such members asking them to uprate their standing orders to the full subscription. If these are not received by 1st September, they too will be struck off (or 'culled' to use a current term).

The Graduate membership rules have been slightly amended: students will be eligible for the reduced rate either until they are awarded their PhD or for a maximum of 4 years.

Genetic Control of Vertebrate Development'

#### Autumn 1997, University of Cambridge.

'Genomic Imprinting and its role in mammalian development and human diseases'

This meeting will be organised in Cambridge by Anne Ferguson-Smith, Wolf Reik and Azim Surani.

Genomic imprinting confers functional differences on parental genomes in mammals and it results in parent-of-origin-dependent expression of certain, imprinted genes. Understanding of imprinting has advanced greatly since it was previously considered by BSDB (in 1990). This meeting will focus on current work on the developmental role of imprinted genes, on the mechanism of imprinting and the consequences of its failure, and on the evolutionary significance of genomic imprinting.

#### SYMPOSIUM ON SYNAPTIC PLASTICITY

#### **BOOK REVIEW**

#### EXPERIMENTS IN PLANT TISSUE CULTURE

3rd Edition

J.Dodds & L.W.Roberts
Cambridge University Press

Since "Experiments in Plant Tissue Culture" has been on our laboratory shelf, it has been well-thumbed. The text deals in a clear and concise manner with all problems which might be encountered by the student and researcher attempting tissue culture of higher plants. The authors are not content merely to give recipes: each chapter also includes a fascinating resume of the concepts and history behind the techniques, which is most important to young researchers entering the field.

I was disappointed with the absence of a chapter about tissue culture of primitive plants, such as *Chlamydomonas*, ferns and mosses, or one concerning the particular problems of woody plant tissue culture. I recognise that the use of a restricted number of experimental species enables comparison between work conducted in different laboratories, but neverthe-less I feel that Botanical research would be poorer if reduced to considerations only of *Arabidopsis* or *Nicotiana*.

In summary, a worthy text and an excellent addition to any plant science laboratory.
